


Editorial

Obituary RAY HIRST. 1911-2001

Raymond Hirst died on Friday, June 15th, 2001, after a short illness. He had been a member of this branch for less than a year.

Ray had been something of an adventurer in his younger days with trekking trips in many parts of the world, and while still in his twenties, he went to Spain to join the International Brigade in the Spanish Civil War. During the Second World War, Ray served with the RAF as a fighter pilot and spent some time as a flying instructor in Canada. He also served in Iceland on anti-submarine patrols.

Ray always had a great love of flying and it was his wish that on his 90th birthday, just a few months ahead, he would perform a loop-the-loop in a glider.

Ray leaves a wife, Jennie, and three children, to whom we send our deepest sympathy.

The Standard Bearer and four other Branch members attended the funeral on 20th June.



Remembrance

THE LEICESTERSHIRE Festival of Remembrance will be held at the usual venue of de Montfort Hall, Leicester, on

Did you know ...

CREDIT FOR THE great victory at El Alamein is usually attributed to Montgomery's military genius and the

fighting spirit of the Eighth Army, but writing in the Sunday Telegraph, Dr James Le Fanu, put forward another theory.

Rommel attributed his defeat to diarrhea! He was actually still convalescing from this disease when the battle commenced

The area to which the Eighth Army had been forced to retreat had become "badly fouled" due to slackening standards of hygiene. Flies were a serious plague and newly arrived troops were vulnerable to "gippy tummy" and sandfly fever.

This hygiene problem was methodically tackled from the halt at El Alamein. It was dealt with by specially formed units. Incineration of refuse and petrol-tin latrines were introduced and this daily burning greatly improved the general health and therefore the morale of the British troops.

The Germans never instituted such measures, and as the Eighth Army advanced, they found the lines and camps they captured in a really filthy and disgusting condition, with human and camp waste lying everywhere.

The conclusion is that the enemy paid for his contempt of hygiene with an phenomenally high instance of diarrhea disease, which affected more than half their troops and so played a major part in the Allied victory. Ω

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Annual Conference 2001 BOURNEMOUTH 26th –28th MAY

REPORT ON SUNDAY MORNING SESSION by Betty West

Having finally received confirmation that the Branch had indeed been awarded the Certificate of Merit — Lister Cup, it was proposed that the Chairman and Secretary attend that part of the three-day Annual Conference in Bournemouth when award presentations are made. We accordingly set out on Saturday 26th May with plans to be present at the morning session on Sunday 27th from 9.30 am to 12.30 pm.

This was probably the first time in the history of the Branch that Market Harborough had been represented at the Annual Conference, and certainly neither the Chairman nor Secretary had ever attended a Conference of this magnitude. The Bournemouth International Centre seemed to be full of smart, be-medalled Members and, when seated, the 700 plus delegates filled the main part of the Hall.

Your Chairman was initially on the stage, awaiting the presentation and I was in the large balcony as a 'guest'. You would have been proud to hear the name of Market Harborough ring round the Hall and the highlights of our application read out as the citation to worthy Certificate of Merit Winners:

Only 114 Members but 30 events organised and £33,000 raised for the Poppy Appeal over three years; £354 raised in Pedal to Paris...

The Chairman received the framed Certificate, words

of congratulations and was photographed before leaving the stage. Other presentations were made and it seemed the large majority of these went to Northern Ireland and Suffolk (see photo in May/June issue of *Legion* magazine.

The business of the morning concerned the Accounts to September 2000, addressed by the General Treasurer, with questions from the Delegates on clarification of such matters as insurance costs; Women's Section accounts; advertising revenue from the Legion Letter and Business Loans. This

was followed by the continuation of voting on Conference Motions. I was surprised by the ferocity of the arguments; the queues of Delegates to speak For and Against and the speed and efficiency of collection and counting votes! The official report will be available later but some items which took my attention during those three hours were:-

The Millennium Poppy Appeal had surpassed its £20m goal by reaching £20,197.55 up to that morning. Accordingly the targets for the next three years will be £25m!

Business then continued from the first day and, following voting on a further three Motions which included some very heated debate on the proposed revisions to the Charter, the Secretary General gave a short address. He referred to Branches having difficulties appointing officials and talked of a possible single Membership category as being one way to cut the administrative burden of Branches.

In conclusion, I must say that the Chairman and I found our attendance at the Conference most interesting and enlightening and would recommend a short visit to any Member, if

only to appreciate the important role we all play in such a large charity organisation. One final comment, I was disappointed that the morning session did not start with the Act of Homage to remind us all why we were there (no doubt they would argue that Standards, Dedications etc are
