I HAVE RECENTLY joined a genealogy group in an attempt to trace my own and my wife's ancestors. Through the family we have been given a document that once belonged

to my wife's grandfather. It is his army paybook. When I was in the forces, we knew this as an AB64 Pt II, but in 1884 when he enlisted, it was known as Army Form B 50.

George Edward Wringe joined the Leicestershire Regiment of Foot on 30th December, 1884, and his number was 1155. This was not his "last four" but his full number!! That's a real Old Soldier. He enlisted for 7 years with 5 years in the Reserve.

This paybook shows that he served in Leicester (1884), Aldershot (1886), York (1887), Lucknow India (1888), Myingyan, Burma (1889), Aden (1890) and The Tower of London (1890).

He was promoted to L/Cpl in 1890 but was deprived of the rank in 1891 while serving at the Tower. A family story claims that he got drunk and actually fell into the moat. Conduct unbecoming, etc.??

I'll tell you a bit more about the notes, etc, in this interesting book at a later date.

Two of our members were married recently. They are Frances Cotterill and John Swannack. I feel certain that all branch members will join me in congratulating the couple and wishing them both a long and happy future together.  $\Omega$

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### Naval Enquiries by Tom Ashmore

ONE OF THE NAMES on

the town WW1 War Memorial is Simpkin C B who, research for the Books of Remembrance revealed to be Sick Berth Attendant 2nd Class Charles Bertie Simpkin who served on HMS Kent and who died on 6th July 1918, age 36. Commonwealth War Graves commission records show that he is buried in Plymouth Old Cemetery (Penycomequick).

When my wife and I visited Plymouth recently we went to the cemetery and took photographs of the grave to include in Volume 5 of the Books.

We were saddened to learn that this large (30 acre) cemetery had fallen into an appalling state of neglect under the private company which had owned it. Following the company's bankruptcy, the cemetery had been acquired by a trust whose volunteers have been gradually restoring it to a state worthy of the memory of those buried there. The plot containing Simpkin's grave is still quite rough but all the graves are accessible. However, there are still large areas where the graves are still completely hidden under thickets of bramble.

There are over 200 Naval graves, most of which are marked with tall grey slate head-stones, each inscribed with the man's name, rank, age, date of death and ship. Two things puzzled us: why were there so many deaths from HMS Vivid and why were many of these Boys with ages as young as 14?

To solve the puzzles I consulted our naval types. Jim O'Brien, "HMS Vivid? Never heard of it." Bill Cotton, "Leave it with me- I'll ring you back". Later, "According to Portsmouth Naval Museum HMS Vivid was a Plymouth shore training establishment which after WW1 changed its name to HMS Drake". Bill also reminded me that he had joined as a Boy (see In Touch Issue 9) but couldn't suggest why those at Vivid had died. Jim when told that Vivid became Drake, "Well, I'm blowed. I trained there in 1947!"

The question I asked neither Jim nor Bill, "What was Simpkin's ship HMS Kent?". Anyone know? Answer or more info on Vivid, Drake or Plymouth Naval base to the Editor please.  $\Omega$

#### What was F & H?

ONE MEMBER BELIEVES he has the answer to the question posed in the July

Issue. When Pte John Bolton wrote from France in June 1915 to his pal Jack Dimbleby asking "Is the trade very brisk at F & H this year?", he may have been referring to Foster and Hine. According to Tom Jeacock a boat hire business under that name was established on the canal near the bridge on the Leicester Road in 1910. Associated with it was what would now be called a transport café called "Uncle Tom's Cabin". Tom also says that regattas were organised on the canal by F & H.

This information has been passed to the Harborough Museum which now holds the transcripts of the Bolton letters some of these make reference to local soldiers who died in the War and whose names are in The Books.

Have we anyone amongst our members who is, or who knows someone interested in the history of the Harborough branch of the canal who might be able to provide any further information?  $\Omega$
