

Christmas Visit '97 by Hotspar

There can be few places in the world where one can stand and say, "History was made here - on this very spot". Over the Christmas holidays I was able - nay privileged - to do just that.

Little did I realise as I was driven through the gates towards the Guard Room, and then on to the mess, that I was entering a building which, to my generation, is hallowed ground. I was entering Bentley Priory, home to 11/18 Group Royal Air Force, but in 1940 Headquarters of Fighter Command, the last and greatest command of Air Marshall Dowding. For it was here, in this building and on this very spot that Dowding controlled and conducted the RAF Fighter Squadrons of Hurricanes and Spitfires



over Dunkirk and later over England in the Battle of Britain. Here in this beautiful country house Dowding must have moved from room to room receiving the latest reports, watching the From page 9.

losses mount, all the time knowing of the superior forces available to the enemy. Here, when going out to stand in the beautiful gardens he would have seen the battle raging in the skies above, and here towards the end, when Churchill, visiting to watch the battle for himself, had said to Dowding, "Send in the reserves!", received the reply, "Sir! We have no reserves."

You can hear those words echoing from every wall and ceiling of this historic building, as you look with pride and awe at the many portraits and photos of those who took part in these mighty events. And you tread quietly and reverently over what has become to you in but a few minutes, hallowed ground.

And you can read on every tribute, every presentation, every roll of honour the immortal words which must have echoed through these rooms and corridors when Dowding and his men knew that they had won - "Never in the long history of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few."

More than three years later this same building was used by Montgomery in which to plan and co-ordinate the invasion of occupied Europe. From the debacle of Dunkirk to the liberation of Europe this building has seen it all. The fate of our country had bung by a thread, and had been saved by the men who served and commanded from this building.

It was an honour and a privilege, made all the greater by being unexpected, to stand and stare on the very spot where the life of our country bad been rescued and sustained.

Dad's Army by Dick Fulford

War on Germany was declared on 3rd September, 1939. I was too old to be conscripted at that time so, eager to be "in on the fun", I volunteered to join the Royal Navy the following month. The Navy however, was then fully manned, all reserves having been called up. So I had to wait, and wait I did until August 1940.

For a month or so after the outbreak of the War, little happened; it has since been referred to as the "phoney war". But the bubble burst in a big way in the Spring of 1940; Denmark, Norway, Holland and Belgium fell to Hitler's Forces in April and May, and in June France surrendered on the 22nd, followed by the Channel Islands which were occupied on 1st July.

So Britain was alone - our "Finest Hour" | Now that invasion was more than likely extra defence was necessary and on 25th May the L.D.V. was formed - Local Defence Volunteers or rudely referred to later as the "Look, Dive and Vanish Brigade"! I joined immediately - my 23rd birthday.

Armed with a 4/10 shotgun and a home made L. D. V. Armband I was detailed to report to a cart shed on the top of one of the Wiltshire Downs. Lord Essex had been appointed C. O. of our village contingent and I, being the youngest, was nominated his "runner"; as telephones were unheard of at that time. The other volunteers were aggressive World War I veterans, all armed with ritles, shot guns, cutlasses and home made pikes. Look out Hitler, we, the LDV are ready for you!

Then two months later, on 23rd July 1940, the Home Guard was formed and replaced the LDV. One by one we were kitted out with Army uniform but I missed out, for just a month later my uniform issue was Navy blue and my Army career had ended.

I am proud, however, to have been a volunteer in "Dad's Army" and I treasure the proof of my service; a certificate signed by His Majesty.



I cannot claim Royal British Legion Ordinary Membership by virtue of my time in the LDV & Home Guard for that was for only 3 months and our Handbook says 6 months service is required. But I do qualify through my subsequent 6 years of service - but that is another story!
