# Remember This? For King and Country

There had been a local armed force in Market Harborough since Napoleonic times, originally called the Loyal Volunteers, eventually becoming the volunteer Territorial, 'E' Company, 1st /5th Battalion. Leicestershire Regiment. In addition there was a mounted unit, a detachment of 'D' Squadron, of Prince Albert's Own Yeomanry. Later the Army Service Corps was

represented in the town with a unit from the Leicestershire and Lincolnshire Brigade Company.

A Territorial Drill Hall was established in King's Head

Place, Coventry Road, in what had been the 'Second Grammar School', vacated after the new Burnmill Road building opened. Although there was some rivalry between the 'Terriers' and the cavalry, both units appear to have used the drill hall as did that of the ASC.

King's Head Place and the Drill Hall no longer exist havng being replaced by Yeomanry Court, a development of apartment buildings. There is still an echo of the military past with the Army Cadet Force detachment buildings on part of the original site.

When in 1914 General Mobilisation was ordered on 3rd August, the 'Terriers' were on their annual summer camp and so had to return to Market Harborough. Britain declared war on Germany at midnight on 4th August and on the

6th 'E' Company, fully kitted, marched from the Drill Hall to The Square for a public sendoff. Local photographer, Mr Speight recorded the event with the above photo

and after a short service and the singing of the National Anthem, the assembled troops marched off. The small ASC unit went to the station for a train to Leicester, but the infantry, on foot, to Oadby where they stayed the night before marching to Loughborough the following day and then to Derby. From there, no doubt with other units, they went by train to Luton.

### The lead up to the outbreak of WWI in Market Harborough

Every thing was normal, the horse was the usual form of transport and was the hunting vehicle favoured by many foreign grandees renting houses in the area for the season. Stabling was available at the Swans, George, Hind and Angel Inns. Hunt Balls were held at their due time. Shops such as the Home and Colonial, Co-op, Symington and Thwaits, Frank Hall and others were looking after the residents of the town and the villages around.

The Cattle Market was held weekly

in the Market Place on Springfield Rd.

There was building work with the enlargement of the town in Coventry Road and Cross, Charles and Gardiner streets of the 'new town'. The houses would all have lavatories

connected to a sewer. The corset factory was having a new block built off Mill Hill and a new Lodging house, designed by the factory architect, was beside it.

Timber and other material was brought in by the Canal which also took away the bales of wool sheared locally and the Chemical Manure from the bone factory. The railway carried the coals, parcels and fish. The Charabancs carried the workers on their outings and the first regular bus service was established.

The Symington corset factory was the largest employer and although they were pioneers in the use of sewing machines in making the garments, ironing was still done by hand.

All was normal.

The Territorials, E Company, of the Leicestershire Regiment was based in

the Drill Hall (where Peomanry Court now stands) and were joined in their recruitment drives by an ASC unit in Leicester, under Col

Blackader, titled Leics, Rutland and Lincs detachment. A Yeomanry Unit had been based in the town for generations under the wing of Prince Albert Own Yeomanry (PAOY) who met at Lutterworth or Billesdon. They locally used the meadows where the Commons car park now is.

Then the war arrived

On 6th August E company marched off to Loughborough enroute for Derby where they were put on a special train to Luton. The Navy men and RAMC (mostly St Johns officers) had already been posted.

A highly patriotic local draper Frank. Shindler started his List of all those on Active Service from the UDC area and from the villages. By Christmas 1690 were serving. Shindler's List changed through the war as the Casualties mounted but was updated each week in the Harborough Advertiser forerunner of the Harborough Mail.

The Ladies of the area set up a War Hospital Depot where they made bandages and packed comforts. Many of the large houses were offered as War Hospitals now that the German and Austro Hungarian occupants had returned home, horseless. Armed guards appeared on the Welland bridges. Part of the Cattle Market was fenced off for a Remount Depot which stayed all through the war.

The able bodied Dad's who were left formed the Volunteer Training Corps Like the latter day Home Guard, their job was to protect the town against invasion

No actual conflict between Britain and Germany is reported so far, though a British cruiser was chased, by German warships. The German cruiser Breslau bombarded a French naval station in Algeria,

The German cargo steamer Pfalz left Melbourne without a clearance yesterday, and the forts at Port Phil-lip Heads fired across her bows. She was subsequently seized.

It is unofficially reported that the destroyer Parramatta has captured the German mail steamer Seydlitz, which left Sydney hurriedly on Monday last.

Many citizens and soldiers all over Australia are volunteering for ser vice in the proposed expeditionary force

All the coast fixed defences are fully manned, and are supported by reserves of militia.

### All over by Christmas

Newspapers on 4 August 1914 reported that Britain's declaration of war against Germany sent cheering crowds surging to gather in Downing Street and outside Buckingham Palace, singing the national anthem.

In the House of Commons, Herbert Asquith, the Prime Minister, was loudly cheered as he gave MPs details of the ultimatum calling on Germany to respect the neutrality of Belgium, guaranteed by Britain, Germany and France in the treaty of 1839. But the Kaiser had already dismissed this treaty as a mere "scrap of paper".

Germany's rail system has been carrying hundreds of trains across the Rhine each day and some 1,500,000 men are believed to have been deployed already. Field Marshall Sir John French, who will command the British Expeditionary Force, has a high regard for the French Army with its tradition of offensive élan and he has been heard to express the opinion that the war will be over by Christmas.

It is a view shared by many but fiercely opposed by Lord Kitchener, the newly appointed Secretary for War, who believes the struggle will be a long one.

### WWI Centenary Commemorations

On 4th August the events started at 7 pm with a short service by the WWI war memorial at the Cottage Hospital. It was followed by the un veiling and dedication of a plaque in the Memorial Gardens and then a Solemn Commemoration in St. Dionysius Church, Readings of the works of War poets were interspersed with those from the Bible, periods of silence, choral singing and prayers Four candles were blown out at intervals and the event ended with the church bells ringing and one tolling in memory of those from the district who died

The branch was well represented in the large congregation.

On 9th August re-enactments of Harborough at War took place on The Square. Cadets in WWI civilian dress were recruited from the crowd to join others in Army uniform. The realism of War was shown with wounded soldiers and by reading letters from the front. Also portrayed was the local women's suffragette movement. Patriotic music of the time was played by the Harborough Band.
