Branch News

January General Meeting

A guest and 25 members were present. They heard that a forthcoming Forward Planning Meeting would consider setting up a Branch Annual Plan: that there would be another meeting of the 'Commemoration of the end of WWI' group; HDC had approved the MH Poppy Walk proposed for 10 June; the MSO (Membership Services Officer) was holding 'clinics' at County Office; the branch had been told of a SSAFA & Age Concern 'Joining Forces Project' for veterans' support; details had been received of a 100th anniversary of the event the RAF event in Leicester; in her report the Treasurer said HQ Membership records showed we had 130 members but there were 2 new members; news was awaited of the new days when the Advice & Information Officer would visit the library; the Poppy Appeal Organiser said what had been received but that small amounts were still expected; activity of the Branch Community Support (Welfare) team were being recorded in the new system for which Betty Ramsay was to attend a training session; the 'Tri-Service' lunch was not as well attended as previously; a new Armed Forces Day Committee was to be appointed: In Touch was complete and being distributed.

After Meeting Event

Stewart Harrison gave a well illustrated talk about the 'Secret War' in Oman where he was serving as part of British military support for that small Gulf state's own forces. These became involved in dealing with insurrection of tribes from the south of the country. Stewart also contrasted the repressive regime of the Sultan with that of his progressive son when he took over as head of state. Applause showed how much the talk had been appreciated.

County Conference

Our Delegate to the County Conference at Melton Mowbray on 13th January was Stewart Harrison who has said "it was an interesting day, useful for putting faces to names you see regularly". Betty Ramsay also attended, as a visitor from our Branch and also as a member of the County Committee (as Youth Officer) and Stewart asked her to prepare notes of the event. THE KENT FORTRESS VOLUNTEERS

Family research by John Cook

I too, had never heard of this august body of gentlemen until I decided to follow through another of my mothers family stories. This involved a cousin of hers who returned from Canada to fight in WWI and having completed this task went back and lost contact with our part of the family. I found the cousin Fred Henham via the 1891 census which shows him as the son of Alfred and Jane, licenced victuallers of the Victory Inn at Barming near



Maidstone, Kent. Fred was born on 3rd April 1883, (a fact that was to prove invaluable in later research).

Sadly, as with so many, his 'Burnt Records' had not survived but the online medal records showed that Fred was recorded as 2085RE 3rd Kent Fortress Volunteers a Territorial Unit that became the 1st/3rd Unit in 1915. The company was largely recruited from men from the Tonbridge area.

When did Fred join? He is shown on passenger lists as leaving the UK in [9] from Liverpool to Montreal on



the White Star Dominion Line ship Southwark and again on the SS Tyrolia from London to Montreal in September 1914. What happened on the intervening trips to and from the UK are as yet unresolved. He certainly qualified for the 1915 Star, War and

Victory i Medals so, as eviden ced below, must have



returned early to mid 1915.

A catastrophic event on the 28th October 1915, proves that he was established and involved before that date. The company left its depot at Gillingham and boarded the troopship Scotian bound for Gallipoli via Madros. On the 27th October they transferred to the minesweeper HMS Hythe for Sulva Bay which, in the early hours of

the morning collided with a much larger troopship HMS Sarnia. The Hythe sank within minutes with the loss of the CO of the 3rd and 128 other ranks. The survivors, 4 officers and 78 ors were picked up by the Sarnia and returned to Mudros. On



the 20th November the survivors re-embarked and and landed on the same day at Cape Helles where they were attached to the 52^{-d} Lowland Division.



This is where the first landings were made on 25th April V Beach beneath the Sedd e| Bahr castle. It became a base for later landings and may be where Fred was put ashore

Fred's war was not yet over, on the night of 7th January the Division was evacuated from Helles to Egypt where the 3rd Kent Company transferred to the 29th Division on the Western Front. They were involved in the battles of the Somme, Arras, 3rd Ypres, Cambrai, Lys and the Hundred Days Offensive. They

became the 595th (3rd Kent) Field Company RE on 1st February 1917 and were disbanded mid March 1919.

Medal cards show that following an Army Council Instruction of 1st February, Fred's Territorial Force Number changed to regular army number 541211 RE. He was Mentioned in Dispatches in 1918, but as yet no details have been found.

He returned, ironically, on the SS Scotian, his former troopship, now operating for Canadian Pacific Ocean Services Ltd, in April 1920 but with the final destination listed as USA via Montreal. The next trace of him I have found is a USA WW2 Draft Registration 1942 where at 59 years of age he was not called upon for service and presumably carried on working as an electrician for the Everhot Manufacturing Company in Maywood, Illanois.

On a Public Family Tree his recorded date of death is in 1973 at Volusia, Florida, USA. Unfortunately the only photo I have found of him is in an online report of the Hythe tragedy in the Kent and Sussex Courier archive which is so degraded as to be unusable.

In conclusion, once again my mothers snippets proved to have more than a grain of truth.



year. He gave thanks to Standard Bearers, for whom there is a heavy demand the Festival Conference Committees and Melton Mowbray for hosting the Conference.
