The Commonwealth

On the 11th March we celebrate Commonwealth Day. The Commonwealth is a voluntary association of 56 independent and equal countries in Africa, Asia, the Americas, Europe and the Pacific. The current Secretary-General (the sixth since inception) is the Right Honourable Patricia Scotland KC.

Each year Commonwealth Day is celebrated on the 11th March. The celebrations take place over a period of a week and include events and activities happening around the globe. The celebrations include faith and civic gatherings, debates, school assemblies, flag-raising ceremonies and cultural events.

The Commonwealth does a variety of things including -

- 1. Promoting democracy, good governance, peace and the rule of law.
- 2. Assists to boost trade between member countries, to create prosperity for all.
- 3. The Commonwealth Office of Civil and Criminal Justice Reform has an input in transforming the operation of justice systems and the delivery of justice across the Commonwealth. It doe this by providing user-centred legal knowledge products, networks, and platforms, to ensure equal access to justice for all.
- 4. The Commonwealth Countering Violent Extremism Unit supports Commonwealth member countries to prevent and counter violent extremism. A mandate was drawn up at the London and Kigali Summits, so that the Commonwealth Secretariat Countering Violent Extremism (CVE) Unit can work with member countries to prevent violent extremism and counter terrorism. It shares good practice, providing technical assistance and policy advice.
- 5. The Commonwealth Secretariat's Human Rights Unit supports Commonwealth countries' efforts to promote, protect and respect internationally recognised human rights principles, standards and practices. DW Source https://thecommonwealth.org/





The RBL Battle Back Centre Lilleshall

he Royal British Legion Battle Back Centre Lilleshall was opened in 2011 to help Armed Forces personnel who are wounded, injured or sick to achieve the best possible recovery and either return to duty or make a smooth transition to civilian life.

The Battle Back Centre is fully funded by the RBL, but it needs constant support, the equipment and maintenance, even down to simple beds and bedding all require constant and much needed funding. In addition to their work with assisting the recovery of those suffering from both physical and mental injury, the Centre is open to all veterans, regardless of age, but there are some joining criteria for full participation in the courses, further details below.

Many of the participants in the recovery courses conducted by the staff have gone on to represent their country at many top-level sporting event and

challenges, including the recent Invictus Games.

Veterans Course Selection Criteria –

Participants must:

Be independently mobile.

Able to independently transfer from one vehicle to another.

Able to participate in activities.

Have a moderate level of mobility and fitness.



Not have been detained under Sec. 2 or Sec.3 of the Mental Health Act within the last 3 months or

currently under a Community Treatment Order.

Please note that the Battle Back Centre is unable to provide clinical, medical or nursing support. They will give precedence to those who have not benefitted from other Recovery programme courses and the allocation process will be based on perceived need based on the facts presented. There is no age restriction however the Centre will require basic medical information, to ensure your safety, but details will be destroyed once the course has finished, in accordance with RBL GDPR

policies and procedures.

The course is fully funded by the British Legion and is free to attend. All meals and use of equipment is included. We do provide a mileage allowance, should you need to claim. Op Courage - The NHS Veterans Mental Health and Wellbeing Service

he NHS launched Op Courage in 2017 to assist in specialist care and treatment of those in the UK armed Forces who are veterans, reservists or about to leave the service. The NHS clinicians include those who have a military background and are highly experienced in supporting the members of the armed forces community. The team works with various veteran organisations to assist in spotting the signs of mental ill-health and obtaining the right treatment and support.

Some of the issues that can be helped with include feeling overwhelmed, feeling low or unmotivated, trouble with sleep, problems with moving on from military life, controlling anger and frustration, alcohol, drug and gambling issues and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

The NHS team includes Clinicians who have either a military background or are highly experienced in supporting members of the armed forces.

The first step is to make contact. Please see the poster on the second last page for phone numbers and email addresses.

After making contact you will be invited to meet with a clinician either face-to-face or by video call to establish what can be done to help. They will then tailor make a plan to suit your needs. You could be referred to other specialist services depending on requirements. If you would like family members to be involved this will also be arranged.

You can also contact your local GP for assistance and referral. Nobody needs to struggle on their own. The armed forces is one big family and there is help at hand! DW

Following a distinguished Naval career which included the award of a Distinguished Service Cross (DSC) for action in the Falklands War and culminated in his appointment as First Sea Lord, Lord West served in government as Parliamentary Under Secretary of State at the Home Office for which he was awarded a life peerage. From his position in the House of Lords, Lord West remains highly influential in defence related matters and those of national security. As a prolific writer of articles and letters, his views continue to be widely sought and expertly conveyed through media coverage.

Addressing us on the subject of "National Security", Lord West gave a frank and wide ranging round-up of geostrategic and geo-political issues as well as giving an honest insight into many of the challenges facing today's Armed Forces. Questions were then invited from the audience, all of which were met with insightful responses. The opportunity to listen to such an informed speaker was greatly appreciated by approximately 100 members and guests, 50 of whom then enjoyed a delicious supper cooked by a local caterer.

A number of Lord West's term-mates who joined the Navy with him at Britannia Royal Naval College attended and all present enjoyed an informative, convivial evening ensuring a great start to our programme for the year.

Private Alec Hopkins - Royal Marines Light Infantry

Light Infantry. He was born in 1898 in Kingsclere and died in Edinburgh at the Rosyth Naval Hospital on 14th January 1919 aged 20 as a result of glandular fever due to an infection of wounds received on the Western Front. He was in the Chatham Division, Royal Marine Light Infantry and was the son of George and E. E. Hopkins, of Barton House, Kingsclere.

During the First World War the Royal Marines consisted of the Royal Marine Light Infantry (RMLI), sometimes referred to as Red Marines and Royal Marine Artillery (RMA), sometimes referred to as Blue Marines. Both elements were to be found on board a Royal Navy ship. The RMLI were under command of the 63rd Royal Navy Division (RND) while deployed on land for the First World War. The RMA were also deployed on land in batteries and were deployed with army artillery. 63rd (Royal Naval) Division was an infantry division on active service from September 1914 to April 1919. The division saw action during the Siege of Antwerp (1914), Battle of Gallipoli (1915), Battle of the Somme (1916) and the Third Battle of Ypres (1917). To begin with the Division was raised from reservists and volunteers of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines. In 1916 the RN Division suffered heavy losses and was then transferred to the British Army as the 63rd (Royal Naval) Division. After the beginning of the First World War a Marine Brigade was raised from four infantry battalions

was formed from men of the Royal Marine Light Infantry and Royal Marine Artillery and placed in four infantry battalions. Each battalion came from Chatham, Portsmouth, Plymouth, and Deal respectively and took on the name of their depot. The purpose of the units was to secure and defend ports established overseas. Two further brigades consisting of volunteers (four battalions each) were raised soon after. The eight battalions were named Drake, Benbow, Hawke, Collingwood, Nelson, Howe, Hood, and Anson. Thereafter each battalion was numbered from 1 to 8. These comprised 63rd Royal Naval Division. Once trained and equipped the division deployed to the Western Front.

British and French forces in Belgium were being pushed back by the Germans and the supply lines from Britain were vulnerable. On 24th August 1914 German cavalry patrols reached the port of Antwerp, Belgium. This imposed a threat as the Germans would be able to launch a naval attack from there on the southern coast of England. On the 27th August the Royal Marine Brigade landed to secure Antwerp and hold it. On 30th August the rest of the RMLI landed. The idea to use Antwerp was abandoned as western France was a better option and the RMLI were withdrawn on 31st September.

<u>Gallipoli</u>. The 63rd RN Division was deployed to Egypt and then participated in the Gallipoli campaign, fighting at Anzac Cove and Helles. On 28th April four battalions of the Division were deployed to Anzac to reinforce Australian and New Zealand troops. After this the Division deployed to Helles and remained there until the end of the campaign, when it deployed to France.

<u>Western Front</u>. The 63rd RN Division participated in the last phase of the Battle of the Somme on the River Ancre to capture Beaucourt. They had four objectives - to capture the German trench complex (Dotted Green Line), the road to Beaucourt station (Green Line), a trench around the remains of south west Beaucourt (Yellow Line) and Red Line beyond Beaucourt. 1st RMLI bns Howe, Hawke and Hood attacked the Dotted Green Line and Yellow Line. 2nd RMLI bns Anson, Nelson and Drake attacked the Green Line and the Red Line. Beaucourt was captured by the Division.

The 63rd RND continued to fight and were deployed on the north bank of the Ancre to attack German positions on 17th February 1917. 188 Brigade and two battalions of 189 Brigade captured 700 yards of the road north from Baillescourt Farm towards Puisieux, to gain observation over the key terrain of Miraumont. They then went on to participate in the second Battle of Passchendaele from 26th October to 10th November 1917). 188 Brigade of 63rd RND captured Varlet Farm and Banff House. The centre of the attack was halted on the road between Bray Farm and the village of Wallemolen. That night Banff House was abandoned and the line reformed at Berks House. On 30th October, the 63rd RND came under heavy German artillery fire at their start line. Minimal progress was made and they were unable to link up with the adjacent Canadians. This meant that the troops at Source Farm and Vapour Farm were vulnerable. The Canadian outpost at Source Farm was reinforced to form a defensive flank to Vapour Farm. The 63rd Division suffered 3,126 casualties between 26th and 31st October. Night attacks allowed the position to be consolidated at a further loss of 14 killed and 148 wounded. It is most likely that Private Alec Hopkins was wounded in action at this time and evacuated back to England where he died. Dw

ings Worthy is just outside Winchester and I had the opportunity to visit the local church in an ongoing quest to find Commonwealth War Graves and photograph them. This is part of a task I set myself several years ago to remember the Fallen wherever they may be resting. The church is on a pilgrimage route from Winchester to Canterbury and has a memorial to those who fell in both world wars (as above). Of interest is a grave to a nurse of the British Red Cross, a sergeant of the RAF and a captain in the Army Education Corps. There are also many names on the memorial and a grave of a captain in the 60th Rifles (King's Royal Rifle Corps). Photos taken by Olive Wall, DW

The 1939 - 1945 Canada Voluntary Service Medal



his medal was awarded to Canadian forces for eighteen months service between 3rd September 1939 and 1st March 1947. The Maple Leaf clasp on the ribbon indicates overseas service. There are other bars awarded for wear on the ribbon. They include one for Dieppe, Hong Kong, an ascending aircraft for bomber crews. 650,000 were awarded, and 525,500 have the Maple Leaf clasp for overseas service. DW
