A FASCINATING STORY FROM PAUL MCKAY - Tuesday 10th March

On Tuesday 10th March, Branch Vice Chair Paul McKay will be Guest Speaker at the RAFA Rushden & District Members' Meeting, held at the Windmill Club, Glassbrook Road, Rushden, NN10 9RP, commencing at 7:30pm.

Paul shares what happens when you swap polished shoes and parade grounds for walking boots, blister plasters and an ancient pilgrim trail walking the historic Camino de Santiago; a journey that tests body, mind, patience and occasionally faith in hostel hygiene and French Spanish mapreading.

Blending humour, hardship and honest reflection, his entertaining talk explores:

- What veterans carry with them long after the uniform is hung up.
- How resilience, service and camaraderie unexpectedly resurface on the trail.
- New friendships forged between sore feet, shared meals and dodgy bunks.
- Why purpose and belonging does not end with active service.

Expect some good-natured tri-service banter, humility and a few hard-earned lessons from hundreds of miles on foot. Come for the stories. Stay for the camaraderie. I think this was explained by a statement that Paul made in the past along the lines of, "*How far can a Veteran walk without a NAAFI break?*" 😊

- Helping ensure the Legion remains resilient, relevant and responsive

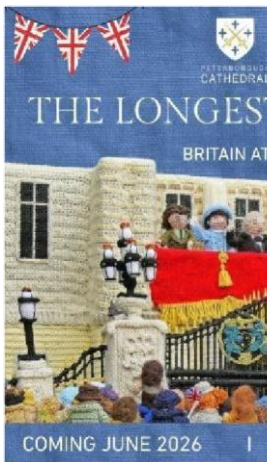

THE LONGEST YARN II: BRITAIN AT WAR: 3RD JUNE - 4TH JULY 2026



Building on the popularity of last year's exhibition "*The Longest Yarn*", Peterborough Cathedral is pleased to present its much-anticipated sequel, "*The Longest Yarn II: Britain at War.*"

This remarkable exhibition features 80 intricately crafted panels of "wool art", each one metre in length, telling the story of life in Britain from the declaration of war on 3rd September 1939 to VE Day on 8th May 1945.

Visitors will encounter key moments including the King's Speech, the Blitz, D-Day, the bombing of major cities, the Home Guard, the Women's Land Army, rationing, and the resilience of communities across the country.

Alongside the panels, visitors will meet 'The Gang' - eight life-size figures representing the people who carried Britain through the war, from a Land Girl to a Spitfire pilot, bringing these stories vividly to life within the Cathedral setting.

WHO IS THE MINISTER FOR VETERANS AND PEOPLE

The Minister for Veterans and People in the UK government is Louise Sandher-Jones MP, a Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State within the Ministry of Defence, who took office in September 2025, succeeding Alistair Carns. She focuses on welfare, housing, and support for current service personnel and veterans, often engaging with military communities and advocating for improvements in areas like accommodation.



Key Responsibilities & Activities:

Accommodation Review: She recently launched a major review into Single Living Accommodation (SLA) to address issues like damp and mould, ensuring better standards for service personnel.

Veteran Support: The MP works on initiatives like the VALOUR blueprint and tackling veteran homelessness, meeting with regional leaders like the Mayor of Greater Manchester.

Engagement: As a Veteran herself, she actively visits military bases and events to understand the lived experiences of personnel and their families, emphasizing her commitment to their well-being.

Background: Louise Sandher-Jones was elected as the MP for North East Derbyshire in 2024. She is a former Army officer, giving her firsthand understanding of military life.

Armed Forces Bill: She said "As a veteran, I was proud to be a part of the Defence team as we passed the Armed Forces Bill through its Second Reading.

This is a hugely important Bill, preparing our Armed Forces for the challenges ahead through its measures to support new technology such as drones as well as improving how we can use the Reserves to give us that strategic resilience we need.

I'm particularly proud of the clauses to improve the Service Justice System, putting victims at the heart and giving Service Police the tools they need to deliver accountability.

Crucially we are also establishing a new Defence Housing Service. We've worked hard to put billions extra into improving the houses our service personnel live in and while I'm pleased with the progress we've made, this new Service will make sure we deliver.

I'm proud that we in this government have taken this big step with this Bill to carry on our work of improving the lives of soldiers and strengthening the Armed Forces we are rightly all so proud of!"

The Veteran Friendly GP Scheme

1. What is the Veteran Friendly GP Practice Scheme?

The Veteran Friendly GP Practice Accreditation, delivered by the Royal College of General Practitioners (RCGP) and supported by NHS England, is a voluntary programme that helps GP practices identify, understand, and better support patients who have served in the UK Armed Forces.

Accredited practices commit to:

- Asking new patients if they have served and accurately coding veteran status.
- Appointing a clinical lead who completes RCGP veteran-specific training.
- Staying up to date with veteran healthcare pathways and Armed Forces Covenant duties.

The Royal British Legion supports the adoption of the scheme, having seen the effective benefits for the Armed Forces community at GP practices that have adopted it so far.

2. Why Is the scheme important?

- Veterans have unique health needs
- Veterans are more likely to experience:

Long-term physical conditions, musculoskeletal injuries, and service-related health issues.

Mental health challenges such as PTSD, mood disorders, adjustment disorders, and substance-related issues.

- Many GPs don't know who their veteran patients are
- Without proper identification, opportunities for specialist referrals or service-related clinical insight can be missed. Accreditation ensures veterans are consistently recognised.
- Better access to specialist veteran NHS services
- Accredited practices can more easily refer veterans to services including:

Op COURAGE – Mental Health and Wellbeing Service

Op RESTORE – Physical Health and Rehabilitation Service

- Supports legal and policy obligations
- Under the Armed Forces Act 2021, GP practices must show "Due Regard" for the Armed Forces community. Accreditation provides a straightforward way to demonstrate compliance.
- The scheme is widely adopted
- As of early 2025, 65.9% of GP practices in England are already accredited, making it a well-established national standard.

3. How you can help a GP practice join

A. Start a conversation

When engaging with a Practice Manager or GP Partner, emphasise that accreditation is:

- Free and simple
- Supported by RCGP and NHS England
- A practical way to improve care for an often overlooked patient group

B. Reinforce the benefits to the practice

Accreditation provides:

- Better understanding of patient backgrounds
- Improved accuracy of records
- Compliance with the Armed Forces Covenant
- Faster and more appropriate referrals

FEMALE VETERANS' TRANSFORMATION PROGRAMME

In November 2025, the Female Veterans Transformation Programme (FVTP) launched its essential [Female Veterans Toolkit](#) to help organisations improve support for the UK's 272,000 female veterans.

Funded by Leading National Partners

The FVTP is supported by the Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust (AFCFT), NHS England, the Office for Veterans' Affairs and the Veterans Foundation, in collaboration with the Cobseo Female Veterans Cluster and the Women's Royal Army Corps Association.

The Toolkit is a practical resource that helps organisations and professionals better understand and support female veterans in the UK. It's built from research and co-designed with women who have served and the organisations that work alongside them.

The following learning opportunities will also be available:

- Lunch & learns
- Tailored online sessions for organisations
- Face-to-face workshops
- Self-guided e-learning

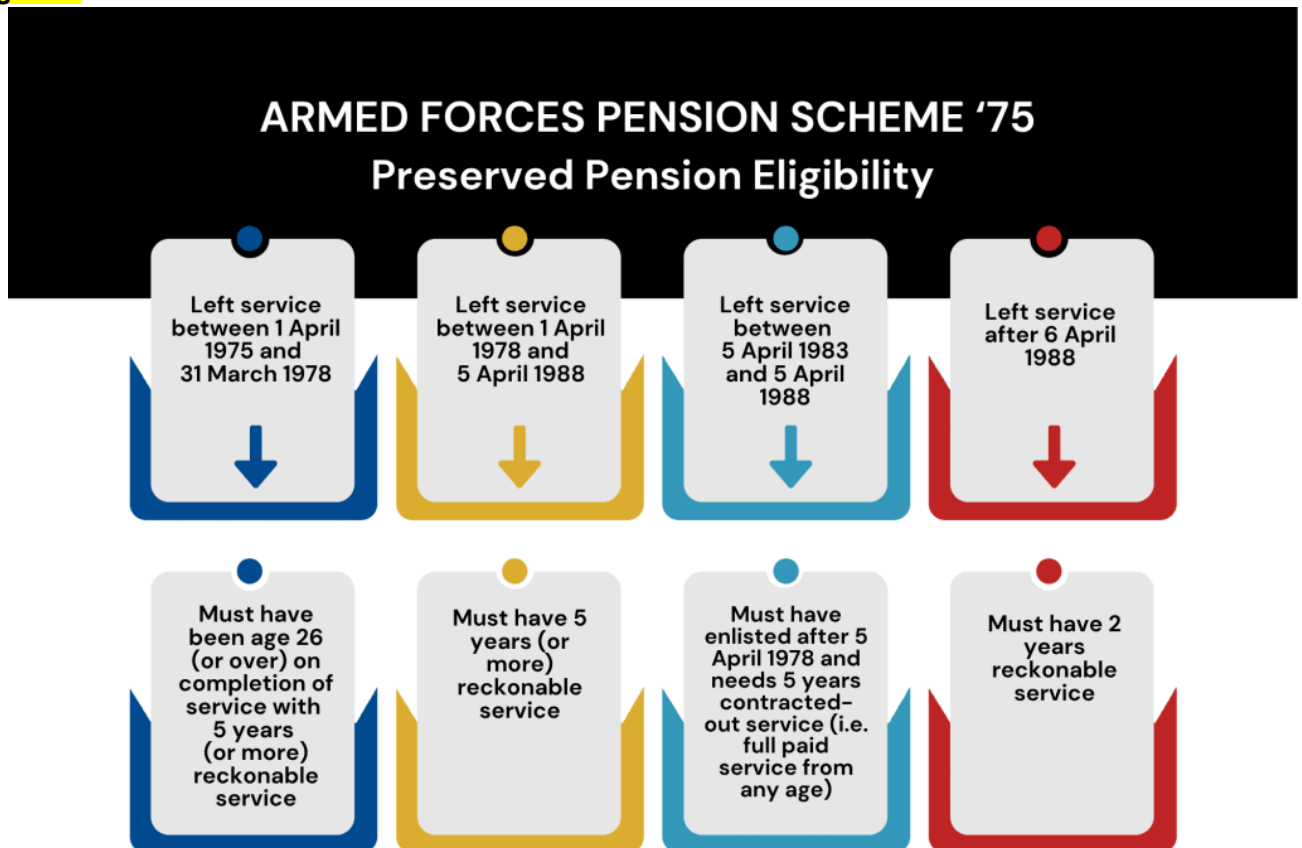
The Forces Pension Society (FPS) and FVTP

VETERANS' UNCLAIMED ARMED FORCES PENSIONS CAMPAIGN

Every year some **2,000** deferred Armed Forces pensions go unclaimed and the sums involved can be significant.

The latest MoD report states more than 15,000 pension benefits that remain unclaimed, down from 17,100 in 2023. This is progress but more needs to be done which is why the **Forces Pension Society Charitable Fund** is supporting the Unclaimed Pensions campaign. They aim to raise awareness and signpost eligible Veterans to unite them with their pension benefits. **Are you eligible?**



Yes? Next steps.

The pension is **NOT** paid automatically – Veterans must apply to Veterans UK using **AFPS Form 8** or call **0800 085 3600** for further information.

If you were married to a Veteran who met the eligibility criteria above and they have sadly passed away, you may be entitled to dependant's benefits. If this applies to you, follow the same steps.

How you can help support the campaign

Donate. Every gift takes the **Forces Pension Society Charitable Fund** a step closer to linking up Veterans with the pensions owed to them. They couldn't do it without our support.

Unclaimed Pensions and the Armed Forces Covenant

The Government has indicated its strong support for the Armed Forces Covenant. In that spirit, **Forces Pension Society Charitable Fund** invite it to do two things: update the rules so that all Veterans, current and future are notified of their pension entitlement, and to increase their efforts to identify those who have not claimed their pension to date and endeavour to contact them.
