Message from the County MSO

he Branch Year End will soon be upon us and our County MSO needs our assistance in providing the local branch committees with support to get the branches compliant with RBL regulations. Branch treasurers play a crucial in getting the branches compliant.

The branch accounts need to be prepared for the year ending 30 June 2022. Thereafter they need to be submitted no later than 30 September 2022. Pete has informed branches that Branch packs will be circulated at the end of June/beginning of July. This allows our branches to start the returns process early (i.e. in July) in order to meet the deadline. Branch Treasurers are advised to pay any outstanding invoices or expenses by the middle of June.

This will ensure that a bank statement is generated in July that shows the balance on the bank account at 30 June. This will be needed for submission with the accounts. If there are no outstanding invoices or expenses to be paid, branches are advised to make a small deposit into the bank account in June which should also trigger the production of a bank statement.

Branch Treasurers should check whether they meet the conditions for completing the Small Branch Return i.e. both income and expenditure are below £500 for the year (excluding any transfers to or from Head Office) and they have less than £5,000 in bank and investment accounts (excluding the BFI and CCLA). If a branch does not meet these requirements, they will need to complete the full return and arrange for the accounts to be independently examined.

Branch Treasurers should arrange the independent examination in advance and contact their MSO if they are experiencing difficulty identifying an IE.

If Branch Treasurers are already aware of any difficulties

Remembering D Day and a Son of Hampshire

Day (6th June 1944) was one of the most important events of the Second World War. This is a tribute to a son of Hampshire who took part. Captain Mortimer Cecil Lanyon, service number 105881, was a member of the Royal Horse Artillery and served during the Second World War. He was from Bishop's Waltham and

gallant and distinguished services in the Middle East (place unknown but could be any of the following - Egypt,

East Africa, Western Desert, Sudan, Greece, Crete, or Syria).and returned to Great Britain when that campaign finished.

He was deployed to France on D Day and landed on Gold Beach on 6th June 1944 as part of 22 Armoured Brigade, 7 Armoured Horse Artillery Division, 30 Corps, 21 Anglo-Canadian Army Group (Montgomery). He saw much

was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant into the Royal Regiment of Artillery on 9 December 1939. He saw active service campaign where he was awarded a January 1944 for



action in north west Europe and was awarded the Military Cross which was gazetted on the 21st December 1944. This was for gallantry near Caen in France on 4 August 1944 fighting against German forces who opposed the Allied advance inland.



The Queen's / King's Shilling

he term "Taking the King's / Queen's Shilling" is a term derived from the times that a shilling was paid to a recruit of the army or Royal Navy dating from the end of the English Civil War. If a person "took the King's / Queen's Shilling" it was a formal agreement that the recipient agreed to serve in the armed forces. The official practice of paying a shilling stopped in 1879 but it continued as a symbolic gesture into the early 20th Century.

Once the Shilling had been received the recruit still had the choice of returning it up to the point that they formally attested before a Justice of the Peace into the armed forces. On attestation the recruit was subject to military law.



Thereafter the recruit was paid a more substantial amount that was then used to pay for a variety of things. In the early days this second amount was approximately the equivalent of half a years wages and was very attractive in persuading people to sign up. At the time the custom was introduced the

daily pay for a soldier was a shilling a day but he was expected to pay for his uniform and food out of this amount. In 1847 a limit was placed on deductions. This made sure that a soldier was paid at least one penny (a twelfth of a shilling) a day, after deductions.

In the Royal Navy press gangs had the power to force men to join up. If a man was forced in this way to join he was given the King's shilling. However there was also the opportunity to join willingly. The incentive for this was an offer of two months wages up front.

Today a person who joins is unofficially described as



"taking the Queen's shilling". This includes non-British and Commonwealth soldiers who join the British Army. There is

The envelope and Shilling below was paid to an officer by the name of Lt Hale, who volunteered to serve with the

3rd Middlesex Regt during the Anglo Boer War 1899 -1902. He accepted the Shilling and posted it home in the envelope to himself as a keepsake of the practice.



Military Museums within close travelling distance

Blair Southenden has kindly done some research into the different military museums in and around Hampshire and wrote this summary. Our county has a rich military history and this is the first in a number of articles that cover the military museums. The first military museum we look at is the Gurkha Museum in Winchester. It is well worth a visit. The photos were taken by me while on a visit there some time back.

Gurkha Museum

Gurkhas from Nepal were first enlisted into the British Army in 1815. The museum covers the

history from that time and explores both the military and cultural aspects of the regiment. Gurkhas are Riflemen and there is a close association between them and the antecedent regiments of the Royal Green Jackets.

The museum is open from Monday to Saturday from 0930 – 1700 with last entry at 1630. Located on the first and









second floors of what used to be called 'Short Block' in the barracks, there is access by lift to all floors and a stairlift is available. Disabled parking is also available. Entry charges are £5.00 for adults, Concessions £4.00 and children under 14 are free.

The museum also provides a regular programme of events; lectures, book launches and these may be attended in person or viewed afterwards on the museum website. See https://thegurkhamuseum.co.uk/formore information.

Soldier's wives and the return of a beetle wing dress

special exhibition about soldier's wives will open at the Royal Green Jackets (The Rifles) Museum, Winchester on 21 May and will run through to the end of August. The centrepiece of the exhibition will see the return to Winchester from the West Highland Museum in Scotland of a special 'jewelled beetle-wing' dress made in India for Barbara FitzHenry, the wife of Captain William FitzHenry, Quartermaster and honorary captain in the 3rd Battalion King's Royal Rifle Corps.

The dress which is one of only twenty known to exist world-wide, and only one of two in Great Britain (the other is in the V&A Museum in London) was made in Madras (now Chennai) in 1867. It was brought back to England when Captain FitzHenry and his family returned on completion of his service in 1870, and the couple with their children continued to live in Winchester. They remained living in Winchester, but sadly Barbara died in February 1877 aged 49 years. She was buried in the West Hill cemetery, Winchester. Within months, FitzHenry had remarried but he died on 25 November 1885 at Ashtead, Surrey and was buried with his first wife at West Hill cemetery in Winchester.

The Royal Green Jackets (The Rifles) Museum is one of the six military museums located in the military quarter, formerly Peninsula Barracks. Know the medal - The Africa Star



his medal was awarded for service in an operational area in North Africa, Abyssinia, Somaliland, Eritrea, and Malta from 10th June 1940 to 12th May 1943. One of three bars could be awarded, to be worn on the ribbon. They were 1st Army, 8th Army and North Africa 1942 - 1943. Members of the 1st Army and the 8th Army wore a small brass number 1 or 8 on the medal ribbon. The North Africa bar was awarded to Navy
