Remembering Air Marshal David Walker CB CBE AFC

It is with great sadness that we share the passing of former National President, Air Marshal David Walker CB CBE AFC, (pictured above at the Festival of Remembrance).

David had been battling cancer for some time and died on Sunday 18 June. David joined the RAF in 1978, completing tours in Germany, the US and the UK before becoming the Military Assistant to the Minister of Defence. He was appointed Assistant Chief of the Air Staff in 2003 and became Deputy Commander of the NATO Joint Force Command before retiring from the RAF in 2013. David completed his term as our National President in May 2019.

Our thoughts are with his family and friends at this difficult time.

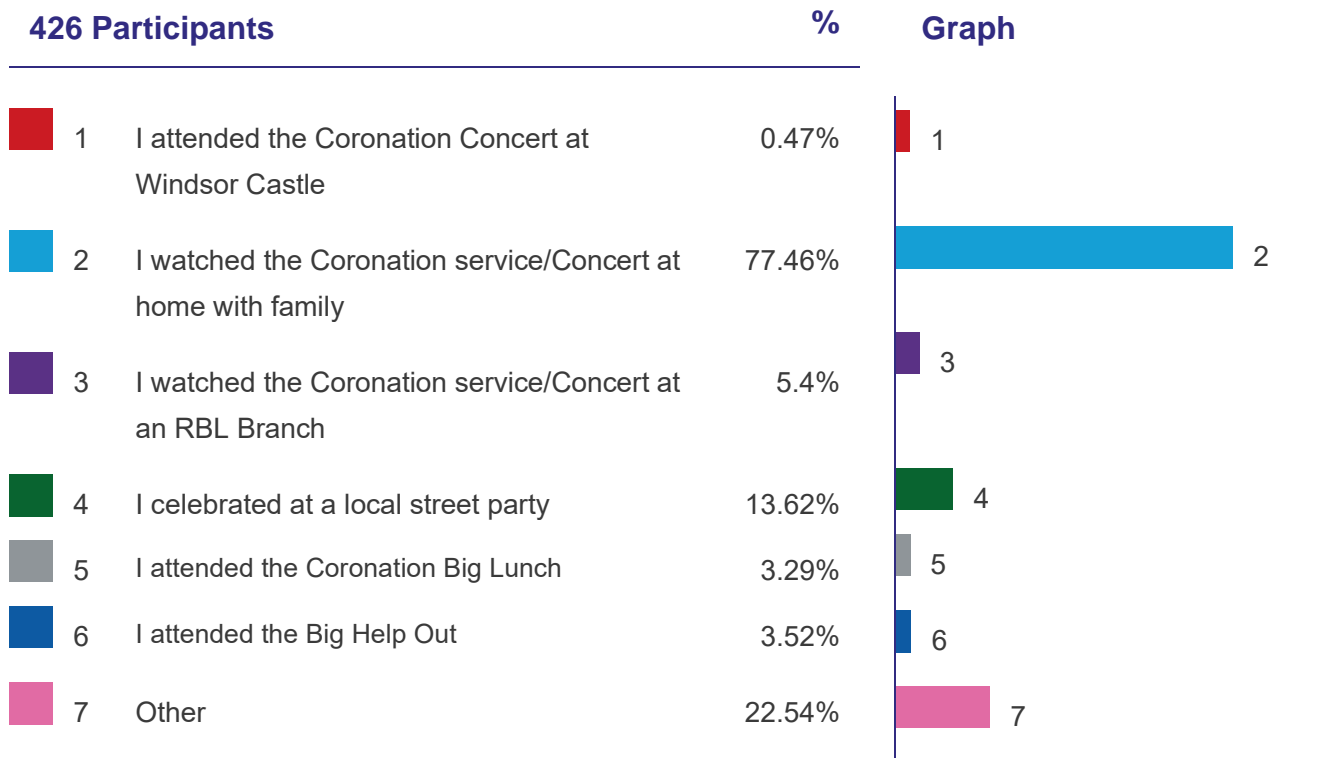
