

85TH ANNIVERSARY OF MERCHANT NAVY DAY

Merchant Navy Day, observed annually on September 3rd, is a significant event that honours the vital role of the Merchant Navy in global trade and national security. This day commemorates the selfless service and bravery of merchant mariners, who have been crucial in transporting essential goods, including food, fuel, and raw materials, across the world's oceans. The date was chosen to mark the sinking of the SS Athenia, the first British merchant ship lost during World War II, highlighting the perilous conditions faced by these civilian sailors. Merchant Navy Day is an opportunity to recognize the sacrifices made by these unsung heroes, who often work in challenging environments and face the dangers of piracy, severe weather, and geopolitical tensions.

Celebrations and commemorations on Merchant Navy Day typically include ceremonies, flag hoisting, and wreath-laying events at War Memorials and Maritime Institutions. The Red Ensign, also known as the "Red Duster," is prominently flown on this day to honour the legacy of the Merchant Navy. Educational programmes and campaigns are often organised to raise awareness about the Merchant Navy's contributions to the economy and national security. These activities aim to foster a deeper appreciation of the maritime industry, and the essential services provided by

A small ceremony was performed at Rushden's War Memorial led by Branch President David Hawker. RN Veteran Terry Perkins carried the RNA Standard and in attendance was the Mayor of Rushden, Councillor David Coleman, Gen Kitchen MP's Representative Chris Ashton, a couple of Councillors and staff from Rushden Town Council, Branch members, members of the public, including Postgraduate Student Social Worker Councillor Victor James from Wellingborough and a 15-year-old Marine Cadet from Wellingborough School. Many of us retired to St Mary's Church Hall for light refreshments.

Paul was a member of the Fleet Arm and was unfortunate enough to have to ditch his aircraft in the sea. Anyone who has done this can join this exclusive club. Paul gave an excellent presentation last month to the RAF Association, which was thoroughly enjoyed by all. Here's what he said......

MAE WEST - THE DARLING OF DITCHED AIRCREW



I was delighted as a new member of the RAFA Rushden Branch to be invited to speak about the 'Goldfish Club' to its veteran community on 10 August. It had to be informative with a bit of 'dry' humour added, as the Goldfish Club is one Club that nobody wants to join.

I am PAUL ANTHONY MCKAY and I recently moved to the district on civilian retirement, after working 20 years in the Middle East in the defence services and diplomatic sectors. There is enough ammunition here for future articles.

But back to Mae West. Why is she revered as the darling of aviators and for me, the sweetest of sweethearts? We love you, Mae!

There are many clubs for those who enjoy being on, in or underwater, but there is one exclusive club that had 10,000 RAF and Allied aircrew members after WW2, but only 300 members worldwide today, for those who ended up in the drink by accident (or in naval parlance having to take the proverbial float test). It's called the Goldfish Club and its members count themselves lucky to be alive.

The Goldfish are aircrew who crashed or bailed out into the sea and survived. Gold for the value of life and fish for the water. It was formed in 1942 by a British draftsman who designed rubber lifesaving equipment. He was so moved by the experience of WW2 aircrews' watery episodes, he formed the Club which still exists today. Many of the former members have crossed the bar, but new members still arrive.

The Goldfish became the emblem showing a white-winged goldfish flying over two symbolic blue waves. Due to wartime regulations, the production of metallicembroidered badges was prohibited and all cloth was severely rationed. These problems were overcome with silk embroidery substituted for wire upon black cloth from old evening dress suits, that were sent in by London Daily Express readers after an appeal. Mae West, because of her sizeable assets, became the name adopted by aircrew for their lifesaving vest.

In response to a message of greetings sent to Mae West, she made it clear that she took great pride in the fact that aircrew had adopted her name for their flotation jackets. The badge is worn by aircrew on their Mae Wests or flying suits.

I have the unfortunate distinction of being a 'Triple' Goldfish member. Yep, three times ditched and where my best friend, Mae West, kept me afloat until rescue. My story began in 1974.

As a young aircrew officer during flying training, I ditched on my first ever night sortie, in a Wessex helicopter with an engine fire on climb-out from RNAS Portland, Dorset into a heavy sea.






It was a surreal moment, I recall, having given the pre-flight crew ditching brief only 50 minutes earlier to my Squadron Boss, there I was in the drink with him, riding the surf in our single seat life rafts; in sight of the lights of the Chesil Beach pub a mile away, enthusiastically firing off red mini flares whilst waiting for the SAR helicopter rescue and winch pick-up.

Still under flying training at 737 Squadron, a few weeks later I ditched again. This time in a Sea King helicopter having suffered tail rotor-

drive failure during an Anti-Submarine exercise in the English Channel. This one wasn't textbook, an uncontrolled ditching, the aircraft spinning out of control; I had to find an air pocket after snagging myself underwater.



Once on the surface and awaiting rescue from the frigates and circling Sea Kings overhead, my survival dingy started to be pulled under the surface with me in it and dragged backwards.

To my surprise the submarine surfaced yards away giving me a second dunking. Sailors on the submarine casing were thrashing the water around me with boat hooks trying to connect with my Mae West and inviting me to climb up the scrambling net they had thrown over the side. In a few polite words, I declined the submariners' vigour to rescue me and waited to be winched up by a rescue helicopter.

As a Sub Lieutenant, I was presented with my Goldfish badge and tie, and SARBE (Search and Rescue Beacon Equipment) Company tankard whilst serving on HMS Ark Royal 824 Squadron.

It was 4 years later as a Lieutenant Instructor on 737 Squadron, that I was returning from Prestwick Airport leading a formation of Wessex helicopters – some 20

miles north of RAF Valley, Anglesey the aircraft suffered an engine failure.

Textbook autorotation to maintain rotor RPM before flaring to reduce speed on impact, but the sea surface was covered in patchy fog; the impact was heavy. I was propelled under the cockpit seat harness and entangled in the co-pilot flying controls semi-unconscious.

It took me several attempts to untangle myself, inflating my Mae West on the surface, I spent about 2 hours on

the surface with staged hypothermia before rescue from the SAR helicopter from RAF Valley. Convincing myself that ditching does not come in groups of four, I completed a military flying career that had further flying incidents, but no more where survival required the use of a life jacket and inflatable dinghy. I was the last crew member to escape the upturned aircraft with some difficulty, having to find air pockets. "I'll try anything once, twice if I like it, three times to make sure." - Mae West

BRANCH COMMUNITY CO-ORDINATOR (BCC)

VETERANS' UNCLAIMED PENSIONS – SOME GOOD NEWS!


The Forces Pensions Society's campaign launched last year has begun to show tangible results. The latest AFPS Annual Report published in July, reveals a reduction in the number of Veterans' unclaimed pensions. This year's report records some 14,800 unclaimed pensions (17,100 in 2023), a 14% improvement.

However, it remains a cause for great concern that there are still almost 15,000 pension benefits that remain unclaimed and thousands of entitled Veterans could be missing out. These are the details:

- Anyone serving after April 1975, now aged 60 or over, could have an Armed Forces Pension if they served for two years or more.
- The pension is not paid automatically, and Veterans must apply to Veterans UK using AFPS Form 8 or call 0800 085 3600 for information.

Commenting on these latest figures shown below, Forces Pensions Society Chief Executive Neil Marshall said:

"It's clear that our call to action to a wide community has made a real difference. But we won't be satisfied until we reduce the outstanding number of unclaimed pensions substantially. Many of these pensions involve significant sums of money which could make a serious contribution to the quality of many lives. So, if you know a Veteran who might not have claimed their entitlement, please visit the Veterans' Gateway website without delay. For our part, the Forces Pension Society will maintain its focus on the issue until we see many more pensions in the hands of those who earned them."





FOUNDING MEMBER OF THE RED ARROWS HAS DIED

Tributes have been paid to one of the founding members of the Red Arrows who was known for his exceptional flying skills - especially at very low level. Squadron Leader (Retired) Henry Prince (pictured above), who recently died at the age of 90, was part of the team that got the Red Arrows off the ground alongside Lee Jones.

Sixty years later (in March this year) the Royal Air Force aerobatic team continues to wow crowds around the world. Henry was Red 7 on the first team in 1964.

A Folland Gnat aircraft was scheduled to fly over as Squadron Leader Prince's funeral takes place. The Gnat was used by the Red Arrows back in the 1960s and 70s before being replaced by the Hawk in 1979.
