

'Protection'

Wearing a poppy helps us to support those suffering from the psychological effects of combat.



Our Remembrance activities

There are several ways to commemorate Remembrance this year:

The Royal British Legion will host the [Festival of Remembrance](#) in the Royal Albert Hall on Saturday 9th November. You can watch it on BBC One.

Through testimony, storytelling and performance, our poignant service pays tribute to the Armed

Forces community.

This year, we're remembering the key battles of 1944 which marked the beginning of the liberation of Western Europe, along with the anniversaries of the end of the Kosovo War and the end of combat operations by British Forces in Afghanistan (Operation Herrick).

Remembrance Sunday is a national opportunity to honour the service of all those who have defended our freedoms and protected our way of life.

The annual **March Past** will take place on Sunday 10th November after the National Service of Remembrance held at The Cenotaph in Whitehall. If you're attending this year, you can [find travel guidance on our website](#). You can also watch on the BBC.

The National Memorial Arboretum will host a **Service of Remembrance** at the Armed Forces Memorial. The service is free to attend but be sure to book your parking online in advance to guarantee entry. There are packages available if you'd like to bring a group.


At 11am on Monday 11th November 2024, **Armistice Day**, we pause for the Two Minute Silence to remember those who have served and who have sacrificed.

Remembering Afghanistan

This year marks the 10th anniversary of the end of combat operations by British Armed Forces in Afghanistan (Operation Herrick). RBL hosted a ceremony at the National Memorial Arboretum in October to mark the sacrifice of those who served in Afghanistan. The UK military deployed troops to Afghanistan in October 2001, as part of the NATO response to the 11th September 2001 attacks. In 2006, British Forces were sent to Southern Afghanistan and experienced heavy fighting in Helmand. In 2014, Britain formally ended all combat operations in the country. Some 150,000 British Armed Forces personnel served in Afghanistan, and 457 lost their lives.
